## THE PIONEER MASONIC LODGE PASSES 33RD ANNIVERSARY.

Mt. Moriah lodge, the oldest in the city, last evening celebrated its thirty-third anniversary. To the members it was an event of importance marking an epoch in the history of Utah's masonry. Weihe, which was in splendid trim. The address of the evening was made by Bishop Leonard who spoke on Masonry and character, telling of the lessons taught by the former and the good character to be derived by living up to its teachings. Miss Louise Savage sang very sweetly, Mrs. Marie Gurrans sang "Down by the River." She has a charming voice which has not been heard frequently in public. Another new vocalist was Mr. C. C. Carson. He gave a solo and also a duet with Mrs. Gurrans. The other selections by the orchestra were "Summer Night's Dream" by Suppe, "The Idol's Eye" by Herbert, "Hearts and Flowers" and "Hungarian Fantasia," both by Lobani. From 9 to 11 o'clock the supper was served in the banquet hall, the orchestra playing a programme of waltzes, marches and two steps.
